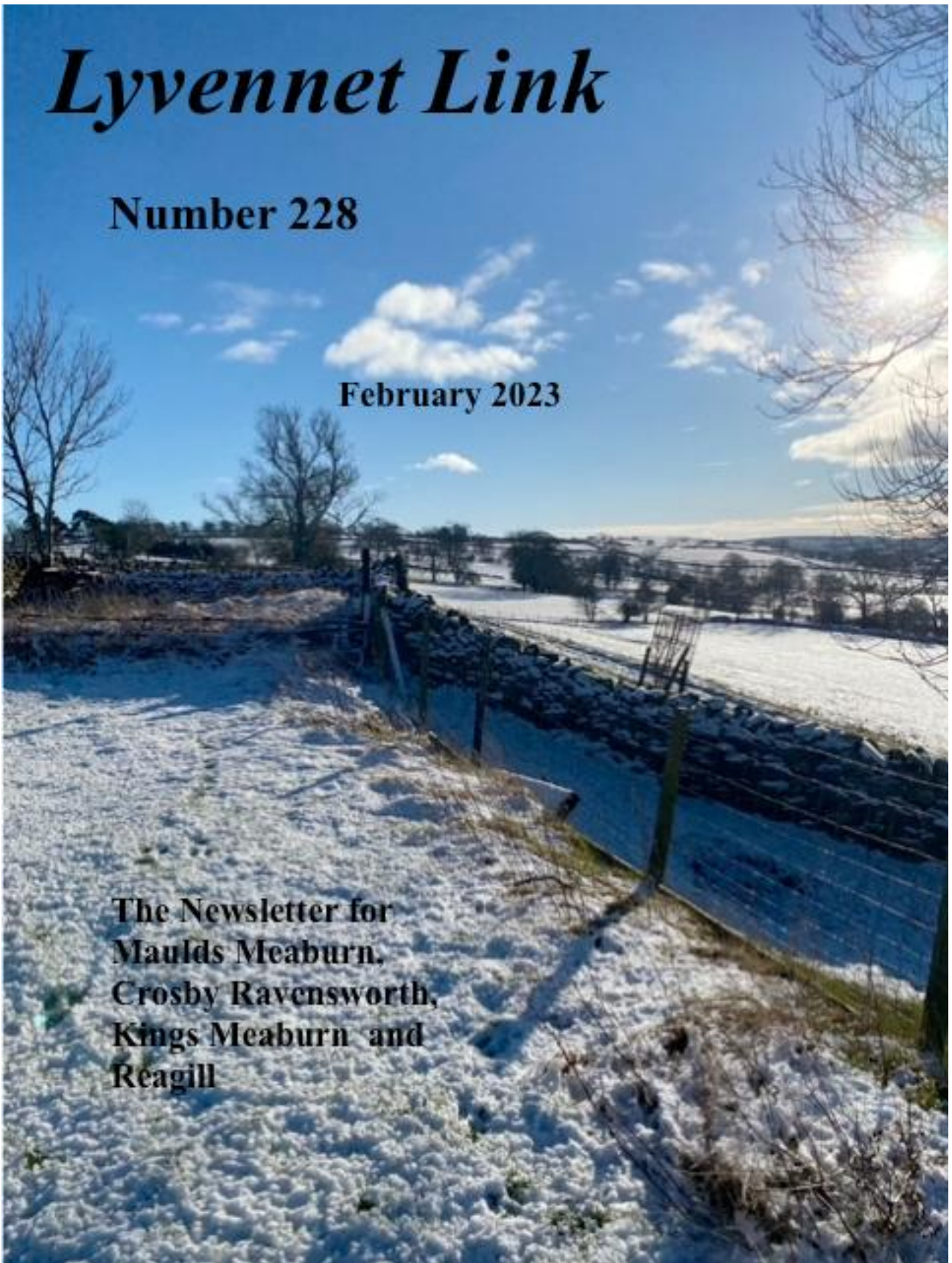

As promised, a further missive from the Maulds Meaburn Village Institute Committee in which you will find an update on the continuing saga of the repair work as well as lots of other activities to report/explore with you.

Firstly, I would like to introduce the present Committee to you. Photos will follow, so that you recognise who we are if you don't already know us.....but I'm sure many of you do know us already.

You will notice that the above list doesn't include a treasurer. For now, we have secured help from Appleby Business Services to set up and monitor our book keeping. This should make the post of **treasurer** much more attractive in that it will be a strategic rather than an onerous role. Should we be able to tempt you to take up this role, please get in touch. At the moment Paul Crisp

has agreed to keep an eye on things. We are looking at different options for a new Chair. So watch this space!

In other news:

The building and its contents- action following the flood

- The Robson room, bar, kitchen and unisex WC (previously the gents' toilet) are now warm and very usable!
- The heating in the hall is only partially working and we are working on solutions to that, with assistance from an electrical and heating engineer. It is about 13 degrees, so fine for Badminton and other energetic activities.
- We are keeping the heating on all night during very cold spells to avoid another burst and on the advice of the insurance broker (so we expect to claim for the additional costs)
- The unisex WC (formerly the gents loo with the urinals screened off) has been deep cleaned and the same will be true of the kitchen and bar area soon
- We have de-scaled and reset the water boiler so that should be more responsive and cheaper to run now!

[if !supportLists]· [endif]The shed floor has completely failed, is causing condensation and cannot sensibly be repaired. We have rescued all the contents we can and are liaising with Margaret and Hazel to see what is still needed and can be stored elsewhere. We are exploring what might happen to the shed itself which is in good condition apart from the floor

- We think that the piano needs to be used, loved and kept in tune which it isn't being, having been used so rarely. We are making enquiries about the possibility of selling it which will then create more storage space. **Let us know if you know a piano teacher who has a pupil who needs to upgrade or any other ideas**
- We have (finally- it has taken A LOT of chasing) got a surveyor from the insurers visiting early next week!

Events

- We are ready to host small bookings (i.e those that can comfortably cope with a single unisex WC). These include Coffee mornings on the first Monday of the month between 10.30am and midday. The next one will be on **Monday 6th February**. Entry is by donation.

Watch this space for a possible tea and biscuits 'drop in' starting up on a Monday afternoon, to coincide with when the post office visits. Maybe choose/swap a book from our bookcase at the same time.

 - Badminton on Monday mornings (9.30-11.30am)
 - Yarn Group (fourth Tuesday of the month between 10.30am and midday)
 - Women's Book Group (second Tuesday of the month between 10.30am and -12.30pm) **Several people have asked about a men's book group- is any one up for starting one up?**
 - Wine appreciation society (usually second Thursday of every other month **but the next one is on Thursday 9th of February at 7.00pm** – a special tasting of the wines of Bordeaux- do join us!)
- We are putting together a new website for the Institute
- We are reviewing our hiring charge rates for external users and will post these on the new website shortly (we'll let you know when as soon as it is up and running).

- We have a number of more formal/ external bookings at a more commercial rate including the post office (please do remember to use this fabulous service on Monday afternoons from 14.00 – 16.00)! Westmorland Dales are also regular external users .

Annual Weather Summary for 2022

Undoubtedly the stand out feature of 2022 is the fact that it has finished as the warmest yet recorded; not just here at Maulds Meaburn, but also in Cumbria and nationally.

It would be a mistake to assume that the record breaking (short-lived) heat-wave in July was the principal cause of the year finishing warmer than average, it only played a very small part.

The warmth of the year was virtually consistent throughout, with nearly all of the months finishing warmer than average and many by large margins.

The year actually got off to a record breaking start with New Year's Day being the warmest on record and with an overnight minimum temperature in double figures.

Winter simply didn't exist. We had no days with '*Lying snow*' and winter finished with a particularly mild and wet February.

April was one month that finished with a mean temperature that was virtually average, but still the spring would be significantly warmer than average.

June was average for both temperature and rainfall, but then came July.

There may be 31 days in the month, but it was just the two, 18-19th, that seemed to matter with temperature records tumbling all across the UK and also here in Cumbria.

The record for the highest temperature ever recorded in Cumbria was actually 121 years old and whilst a maximum of 34.2°C (93.6°F) here at Maulds Meaburn did beat the old record, the warmest place in Cumbria was Brampton with 35.4°C (95.7°F).

The heat-wave in August was probably more notable, it was certainly more intense.

Instead of just the three consecutive days attaining 25°C (the threshold to be classed as a heat-wave) like that of July, now it wasn't just the fact that five consecutive days attained 25°C, but that it included three consecutive days topping 29°C.

August was also a very dry month and completed what was a very warm and dry summer.

Summer continued into the first half of September, but a chilly second half to the month brought the mean temperature down to average.

How bizarre though that in such a warm year that an air frost was recorded on the 17th of the month and which is now the earliest autumnal date in my records to record such.

Autumn would become a mucky season with both October and November being especially wet, resulting in it finishing as the wettest in my records. However, it was also the second warmest.

Up to this point three months in the year had finished as 'average' for temperature, but all of the other eight months had finished warmer by more than 1°C from the norm'.

Until fairly recently December was the one month of the year that had bucked the warming trend caused by climate change and this year it staged a comeback with a notably cold first half to the month.

A run of 13 consecutive nights with an air frost included nine consecutive nights to fall below -5°C of which three consecutive nights dropped below -8°C, the lowest of which (-9.6°C on the 15th) was the coldest night for 12 years.

However, the mildness and rain would return in the second half and it also finished as another 'mucky month'. The first half of the month only saw 2.4 mm of rain, but by the end 134.7 mm had fallen and which is still less than average!

But at least December did also provide us with the only two days of laying snow for the entire year.

Bizarrely though in such a warm year the number of ground frosts (118) finished on average although the number of air frosts (52) was 7.5 below average.

The mean minimum temperature for 2022 was 5.65°C, the mean maximum being 13.56°C (mean temperature finishing as 9.60°C).

This is 0.8°C warmer than average (the closest being 20-14 that was just 0.02°C colder than 2022) Whilst we may not have notched up 100°F in the July heat-wave, the temperature range for 2022 is 43.8°C or ... 110.8°F.

The departure of 0.8°C from the norm' was very typical of the county as a whole, as demonstrated below:

Rainfall

2022 finished with 1193.3 mm (46.98 In) which is 95.3% of the LTA.

Since my records began five have been drier and nine wetter

Whilst virtually finishing on average, rainfall during 2022 was unevenly distributed.

By the end of the summer the ground was rock hard and rainfall was running a deficit, but then the final four months of the year contributed 52% of the final total.

The year's wettest day (36.0 mm – 30th Sept) wasn't particularly wet and whilst six months finished drier than average it was only really August (22.7 mm – 20.6%) that was very dry.

I also have a rain gauge at 'Maulds Meaburn North' and to prove that I know what I am talking about, when I said that it would record less than my 'main gauge', it notched up 1197.7 mm!

At Castlehowe Scar rainfall totalled 1527.7 mm and slightly further afield 970.6 mm (108.3%) was recorded at Appleby (the 46th wettest in a record that commenced in 1857) with Ennerdale Black Sail the wettest place in Cumbria with 3771.2 mm (148.5 In – the 7th driest of 22).

Other

Just a thought ... for an article that I wrote elsewhere following the heat of July and the warm summer I included the following:

" ... it maybe hard to comprehend that for a child growing up today that the summer of 2022 could very well be one of the colder ones that they experience"
