### June 23 An update on Crosby Ravensworth Play Area.

It was a pipe dream to have the new equipment installed and the play area open for the Coronation weekend, slippage caused by the weather the contractors put the start date back by a fortnight. However the day prior to the Coronation the surface contractors informed us late in the day the play area would be ready for opening the following day.

With no time to advertise a hasty notice was sent out to announce the opening at 10 am on Coronation day. Grandparents Parents and children turned up for the opening, Red White and Blue balloons adorned the gate, Frankie who played a part in the fundraising cut a blue ribbon.

Although not completely finished, the fundraising still goes on benches will be purchased, the PC has applied for a grant from the National Lottery, if successful this will go towards a bench.

Work still needs to be carried out on the rockery and the gate needs replacing.

The play area has been very well attended with children of all ages having great fun on the two pieces of equipment suitable for multiple persons, a basket swing and the Inclusive roundabout, which is accessible for a wheelchair or pushchair it also has a standing area and a seat. The other two new pieces of equipment are a flat swing and a cradle swing for individuals to enjoy.

Please note dogs are not allowed in the play area, please refrain from taking bikes and scooters into the play area as they could damage the new soft surface.

Thank you to everyone who has supported the project, those who have donated and purchased goods. The letters of support from the school the play group and the two campsites all helped secure grant funding. Thank you to the shelter volunteers who sift through and tidy the donated goods and move them on to the next charity. Phase two is being considered with a new equipment brochure on order, we look forward to your continuing support. **Joan**

#### Monthly Weather Summary - April 2023

#### Uninspiring - often cool with no warmth. Rainfall above the average

April was a mixed and uninspiring month that trended to the poor side. It had no real warmth about it, the mean maximum temperature falling below average and whilst the number of frosts finished on average, the mean minimum temperature for the month was above average. Whilst the total rainfall finished above average, none of the daily falls were excessive and April

Whilst the total rainfall finished above average, none of the daily falls were excessive and April remains as the only month in my records never to have exceeded 100mm.

The trend of the month was for a run of rainy days followed by a few drier days before the rainy days returned.

Just two days in the month attained 15°c with the day-time maxima mainly subdued due to the winds predominantly coming from the NE-SE.

Frosts weren't an issue, although ground frosts fell on a regular basis.

High pressure, even if not in charge of our weather, was never too far away and subsequently, apart from the one occasion, the incursion of any Atlantic frontal systems tended to be weak. The most unsettled period of the month fell 9-14<sup>th</sup>, but especially 11-12<sup>th</sup> when a more significant low pressure system brought a period of very strong winds and rainfall, heaviest in the LDNP.

During this unsettled spell a succession of low pressure systems arrived from off the Atlantic and it became that April mix of sun, showers and a few longer periods of rain.

Each day saw some rain with temperatures generally below average by day and above average by night. During this period the 11<sup>th</sup> saw a lively low pressure system quickly develop to the SW and move NE across the UK. This brought a spell of rain (12.2 mm), but more noticeably, strong and gusty winds in the evening, a peak gust of 58 Mph, being especially high for the time of year. And in a total mixed bag of weather, the 12<sup>th</sup> could only manage a maximum temperature of 7.3°c, a month's low.

With the 18-20<sup>th</sup> all being dry it maintained the 20<sup>th</sup>'s record of being the driest day of the year since my records began (now 16yrs for April) the most that it has ever recorded is 0.5 mm.

The month's warmest day would follow on the 21<sup>st</sup> (15.6°c) and which also saw a little sunshine with variable amounts of cloud. This was ahead of a low pressure system in the SE moving north into the UK, its frontal system bringing rain overnight into the 22<sup>nd</sup> and throughout the day - technically that overnight rain (14.9 mm) is credited back to the 21<sup>st</sup> which saw it being both the warmest and wettest day of the month!

Come the 24<sup>th</sup> a northerly flow was being drawn down over the UK as the low pressure from the previous days cleared east. As a consequence they were much chillier, dry and with some spells of sunshine, the 25<sup>th</sup> being the best of the three.

However, day-time maxima notably dipped, both the 24-25<sup>th</sup> failing to attain 10°c, the former peaking at just 8.5°c, but the latter under clear skies notching up the month's coldest night at -3.3°c.

MSLP of 1016.4 Mb was +0.7 MB above average for the month and overall a mean minimum of 3.20°c and a mean maximum of 12.05°c saw the temperature 0.09°c below the fourteen year average for this site.

It was the coldest April since 2021 and since the record began (in 2009), nine have been warmer and five colder - the highest maximum temperature recorded during the month being 15.6°c (21<sup>st</sup>), the lowest minimum -3.3°c (25<sup>th</sup>).

Rainfall of 71.7 mm (Maulds Meaburn North 70.8 mm -- Castlehowe Scar 98.3 mm) was 142.8% of average for

2008-22, making it the wettest April since 2016.

In a record that commenced in 2008, twelve have been drier and three have been wetter.

During the month the following 'days of' were recorded: Sleet on one day -- the wind speed averaged 5.50 mph, with a maximum gust of 58 mph (11<sup>th</sup>).

We had 7 Air Frosts and 16 Grass Frosts.

This makes the Jan' to April period of 2023  $0.64^{\circ}$ c warmer than the average for 2009-22 and with 99.6% of average rainfall for 2008-22

Swallows were first seen on the 14<sup>th</sup> this year.

### **Red Squirrels**

23<sup>rd</sup> May – much to report on this month and not all good.

Apart from the on-going battles with greys, to that list I must add mice and horses!

The 'Mice of Reagill' have done for one of our cameras. It may be made of reinforced plastic, but chew through it they will and a cable is just one mere chomp for them.

And I never knew that the resilience and stubbornness of horses also amounted to being able to climb trees just to get at a squirrel feeder!

They have now done for a few around Flass – and these are feeders that I have put up high and which I have to part climb a tree to get to!

And then the greys – the 'June dispersal' has come at least a month early this year. They are very much on the march in numerous locations, but at present mainly around the Sleagill, Kings Meaburn, Crabstacks areas.

We had several reports of greys at Sleagill and near to or in Barnholme Wood (Kings Meaburn – two despatched 23<sup>rd</sup>) and the odd grey still persists in Longhill Wood (MM) and in the gill between Wood Foot and Crosby Lodge (Crosby Ravensworth).

Jerry Moss, the ranger for this patch may be on holiday at present, but he already has a long list for his return at the end of May!

At Jerry's request I now seem to be moving into new areas myself and I've put up several feeders in new locations: Hulls Wood (CR), Mains Wood (MM) and two in the woods at Barnskew. We must say a big thank you to Chris and Andy at Lowther and to the Reagill Shoot for all their support in establishing an increased network of feeders. This also includes a framework by which we will have the ability to deal with any greys during the pheasant season.

Of those new woods in which I have put feeders, all but Mains Wood have a healthy red squirrel population - at first in Hulls Wood the reds were a little shy ...



But they were having me on! By crikey can they eat and the same at Barnskew I still have Spring Wood (Reagill) and Lankaber Wood (Barnskew) to go and will complete this in June.

Apart from plenty of deer, I am also seeing a lot of this at present:



The reds find a tree stump or in this case a rock/stone, take a cone to it and strip it there for the seeds - the stump/rock acts as a table and they pick one that will afford them a good 360° view.

#### And what of our reds?

They are doing OK and I remain happy, but never content – it's fairly straight-forward sorting out a wood with numerous greys in it, but much less so when it is just the odd one here and there – personally I am yet to see a kit.

The P&DRSG presentation at CHVH on 17<sup>th</sup> May proved to be a good night and many thanks to all of you who managed to turn out – I hope that you found it informative and enjoyed the evening.

Whilst it's focus was getting the message out there and not a money raising event, just over £100 was raised in donations with a further £59 in merchandise sales – thank you.

### Reporting a Problem about Roads & Verges

Westmorland and Furness Council is responsible for the maintenance of roads and highway verges. Members of the public can report a fault easily online and add photos via the Westmorland and Furness council's website.

<u>www.westmorlandandfurness.gov.uk/parking-streets-and-transport/streets-roads-and-pavements</u>

An advantage of logging the fault via the online service is that people can provide their email address and receive automatic progress updates direct to their inbox.

The Highways team will then assess the fault and where possible repair it or as a minimum make it safe in line with the council's agreed standards.

### You can report a problem with:

- · potholes and road damage
- drains, gullies and flooding
- trees, hedges, weeds and grass
- bollards
- manhole covers, gully grates and kerbs
- road signs and markings
- pedestrian crossings, traffic signals and street lights
- road structures such as bridges and subways
- road debris and obstructions
- winter maintenance
