Reagill Village Hall

At Reagill we have been recipients of covid grant money for the village hall. We are spending this on necessary repairs to the hall.

At a recent meeting of villagers, we discussed what we wanted to use the hall for and it was felt that it should be a community facility for everyone but especially for the young people to use in the dark winter months. It was also suggested that we use the hall as a 'bothy' or 'stone barn' and welcome overnight visitors. This could provide us with an income.

You can imagine what a lot of hard work has gone into this suggestion and we are nearing the time when we can welcome people.

The transformation is immense. We now have a fully fitted kitchen with new cooker, fridge, microwave and toaster. No broken windows. We have two new multi fuel stoves to complement the existing electric heaters. There is an outside toilet with a door that doesn't hit you on the head when you open it and an inside disabled loo. There is hot water but no shower, we'll have to wait to see whether the bothy takes off before we put one in.

Once all the building work has been completed, we will have the hall decorated and one of the farmers has agreed to clear the garden. It's looking good and we're really excited.

We have now registered with Independent Hostels so all the information about the hall can be found on their website.

Young Explorers Capture the Sound of the Westmorland Dales

Children from Crosby Ravensworth, Great Asby, Orton, Shap, Tebay and Kirkby Stephen Primary Schools have been working with Cumbrian sound artist, Dan Fox, to record pieces of music made entirely from natural sounds collected on a 'sound walk' around their villages.

The collection of short compositions include the sounds of flowing and bubbling streams, birdsong and echoes, the rush of the wind through the trees, the knocking of branches, the vibrations from the twanging of a fence and the voices of children taking part.

The 'Sound Explorer' project is one of many forming the Westmorland Dales Landscape Partnership Scheme, which has been funded by a grant from the National Lottery Heritage Fund with the aim to engage people in revealing, conserving, enjoying and sustaining the hidden heritage of the Westmorland Dales.

Class 2 pupils from Great Asby Primary School said:

"We learnt everything and anything can make sound. We were surprised at how quiet the garden ponds were and found twanging the metal fence really cool. Also, who knew that grass can talk!"

During this unique group experience, Dan used industry standard, battery-powered location sound recording equipment linked via a wireless transmitter to each child wearing wireless headphones. Different types of microphones were utilised to enable the group to listen to different aspects of the landscape. The sounds range from close-up sounds using hydrophones and contact microphones to a wider sonic image with boom microphones and a parabolic dish. The children's favourite sounds were recorded during the walk, edited and mixed back in the classroom to create unique and immersive sound compositions.

The project closed with an online conference between all six of the schools involved, where the children got the opportunity to introduce and share their musical creations with each other. Dan Fox was on hand to explain how the sounds in each piece were collected and how the children discovered the diversity of sounds. An August View from the VEGGIE BOX!

Apologies for missing last month but the GARDEN TOOK OVER! And it was deadline day before I realised....oops.



So, what to chat about this month? Erm.... harvesting has to be the main event really, reaping all you have sown over the past few months. Storing it, eating it, giving a lot away as you can't possibly eat all those beetroots and garden peas! Whatever you decide to do with your hard won vegetables, enjoy the sense of achievement, especially when you dig up those potatoes you just never know what you're going to find there do you? Tomatoes are starting to ripen, cabbage white butterflies are becoming a nuisance, wasps....WASPS!! Have you ever seen so many as this summer? They are also extremely lethargic, and around the plum tree it sounds like a constant humming of the Hebrew

Slaves Chorus! But they are doing a worthwhile job eating the aphids that are infesting a lot of plants at this time of the season, so before you start acting like Attila the Hun, go easy on them!

Now is also a good time to be thinking of planting veggies for the winter in case you didn't start off the seeds last month or June; I expect many local shops have trays of cabbages, leeks (perhaps), sprouts and broccoli at reasonable prices so buy 'em and pop them in the ground ready for your winter fix of vitamins. A general purpose fertiliser such as Growmore would help them along but the best I'm finding is NETTLE fertiliser. Yes, I've been reading up on them and it's one of the easiest and best things you can feed plants on, so find a strong, thick pair of gloves, find some nettles, cut them down a couple of inches above the ground (don't use the roots) and put them

in a bucket, cover them with water and leave for about 7-10 days. Strain them roughly, chuck the remains in the compost, (they really aid the composting process too) and use the liquid, diluted to approximately one part nettle to ten parts water and off you go! Use if you need to,



But do be careful when you are cutting the nettles as they are quite vicious!


